hikoi at the outdoor classroom to eat our breakfast. There will be hot chocolate, tea and coffee provided.



### DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD **RANGITOTO EXPEDITION**

Following a year and half of Covid and stoat infestation delays, the DofE group finally undertook their journey around Rangitoto and Motutapu islands over Queen's Birthday weekend. We ended up with two Bronze groups (C8) and a Silver group (C9-10), both undertaking practice expeditions. As is



typical of Auckland, we experienced a wide range of weather conditions, often in the space of 5 minutes.

Saturday saw two groups climbing Rangitoto in perfect sunshine, other than a little black cloud on the summit that rained on our lunch stop. The groups then made their way to Home Bay campground, carrying full packs with camping gear and food. The weather even prompted the braver to swim (briefly), with Seb C making the boldest splash. A quiet night followed, then two super-organised Bronze groups, who were both ready before the scheduled start time (a DofE record?), set off around Motutapu.



Whilst the Bronze students completed the route back to the ferry and warm beds, the Silvers continued for a

fun day of navigating to imaginary grid references through long grass in the strong wind and driving rain. After a trudge back down the track to the tents, the rain finally eased enough to cook dinner. The shadow party were asleep by 7pm, whilst the students partied until the giddy hour of 11pm. That took its toll in the morning, with a slow start and a steep climb out of the campsite, but they made good time and managed to explore the lava caves in the returning sunshine and make it to the ferry with a few minutes to spare.

## Class 8 Presents... BEYOND INK



Jett came first in the intermediate category with 1437 moth plant pods collected. Clementine came third in the primary school category with 407 moth plant pods collected.

Jett and Clementine headed out each weekend to collect them and even removed two plants and their pods from within our school. Both children also received a spot prize for The Best Photo showcasing their collection.

The competition is run by EnviroSchools and Ngati Whatua Orakei and the local community board. It is open to students at kindergarten, primary, intermediate and high school. This year over 14,000 pods were collected!
