The Meeting of Cultures was an assignment given to the students, including Alijah Williams, at Michael Park School. The students were asked to talk about where they came from and the objects, symbols, colours, images that visually communicate their cultural identity.

while". However, at the end of the dress up day the other office lady Raewyn the Wise said "It's a shame they do not bring a gold coin when they dress up and donate to Charity!"

A beam of light came across the office (and not just from the

photocopier!) and struck the young office lady. "Great idea," she thought "the next time we dress up, we will collect money and give it to Charity!" And so, the journey began.

The young office girl got the lovely teachers to agree and soon another dress up day was organised with a parade and money given. It was fun and we raised some money, but the office girl though we could do more. "If we have our dress up days on Fridays, we can use the lunch bar. I will ask the amazing office staff to help, and we will sell baking" and so we did, and made more money!

The office team were amazing and helpful. One day a year 13

student came and asked if they wanted some help and offered to organise and bake too. Finally, some student involvement!

One of the high school teachers (his name was Colin) also helped and ran the World Vision weekend. Then got sick with cancer. That August it was Daffodil Day, so with the help of the office team and senior students we raised the bar - Wild Hair Day, face painting, a talk to the High School students about Cancer, and a Sausage Sizzle. It was a huge day.

In September our school gave Colin his wedding to the beautiful Irka and then, two weeks a later, his funeral. His sign hangs in the gym: "Make the most of every opportunity."

The office girl thought "Yes - now we must take his challenge. We need to raise awareness, not just money", but it took a while to grow the dream. She tried to inspire some other high school students, but it was hard work. They had so much going on with exams and other activities and dressing up wasn't always their thing!

One day in 2015, across her desk came an invite to World Vision Leaders Day for middle school students. "That's it" she thought, "I need to start early with the Charity Team and grow it through the school." Four students came along and from there we formed the team.



students "Give Hope, Grow Happiness" or "Te koha o te manawa ora" which means 'the gift of the living heart'. Our amazing logo was created, thanks to Kate Le Pelley.

The office girl was joined by Whitney Syverston and we had our first crazy Wheels Day! Then a World Vision journey through the eyes of a young Syrian refugee and a visit to the Mangere Refugee Centre. We were joined by Janette Feenstra with her incredible heart for looking outwards.

PJ days with "midnight feasts", Daffodil Day, Book Character Day, Pink Day, Christmas Kindness, talent shows, volunteers to the after school programme at the Refugee Centre. Movie nights, Cultural Day, Crazy Hair, 40-hour Challenges, High Tea with Mercy Parklands, Reading Buddies, Canteen Café... we even managed events in lockdown!

Then our amazing Tarquin Hooker joined our staff with passion and a heart for service. We painted a fabulous mural at the Refugee Centre. Artwork inspired by refugees was entered into ArtEllerslie exhibition. Sustain-a-Ball was born for recycling ball dresses. Charity cafés were hosted in the high school. Visits to the Refugee Centre, and in return we invited our newest NZ citizens to a day at MPS, with an amazing programme and a basketball game with our fabulous welcoming and warm students.

The Gift of Hope Charity Award was created for senior prizegiving. We have a representative on the student council and, in our last photo we took, we have about 43 students on the Team. WOW!

I am so proud of the team and, although I'm leaving my role at MPS, I am not leaving the Gift of Hope team. By going to the Refugee Resettlement Centre, I hope to strengthen the ties that we have. I will be back - there are still plenty of dress up days to be had! My heart is firmly imbedded in the community of Michael Park.

Thank you to the past and present admin team for your support. Thank you, Louise, for all the help with costumes! Thank you staff for helping and encouraging your students to be involved. Thank you MPS community for supporting and giving us so much encouragement and gold coins!

Immersion

We have started full immersion and it has been tiring but very rewarding. I'm extremely excited and a little nervous about performing, but not only has our acting improved, but also our confidence and our focus. We have been working on our speaking and sending our energy out when we speak. We have all been given our parts and are already learning the movements and lines.

Seeing others make breakthroughs is really exciting and it is particularly exciting to take up a leadership role and see others taking on leadership roles. It is like they have been given permission to care and take control of their learning. Ms Wilson talks about being the "Master of yourself" and we can already see people starting to do exactly that. Sometimes it feels like we are expected to behave like young adults but treated like kids. It is very tiring working on the play, and it is confronting to be challenged, but it is refreshing to be expected to behave like a young adult and be spoken to as a capable person. I also find it exciting and terrifying but mostly exhilarating. I'm sure that week three (when we are all exhausted) will come with new challenges and hardships.


We all hope you come and see the play and the amazing improvement we have made during this time. Although it is a scary thought, we would love a full house!

The play has no swearing or romantic content. It is presented as a story rising up within a young reader's mind and then dissipating. There is no inappropriate content and we feel it is appropriate for Class 5 and above. Jane Eyre faces some hardship in Lowood institution and is treated unkindly by teachers and mildly bullied by some peers. Ultimately it is a 'hero's journey' story, where hardship is overcome and adventures had.

Friday 24th June, 7pm



Please do not hesitate to join us on Friday night.


