PLAY PROCESS 2022

THIS YEAR'S CLASS 10 PLAY

Each class play is unique, and each class rises to meet the challenge in a different way, reaching different heights according to where they are at in their development personally or collectively as a group. For all classes the challenge is there to be met, and the mountain is offered up to be climbed.

Class 10 2022 have really come alive in this process, and we have seen them at their very best. There has been a strong ethos of personal responsibility and a great spirit of collaboration and unity. I am aware that this atmosphere of self-expression and engagement has been helped greatly by the nature of comedy itself,

and the strength and fun of the material. It was a conscious choice on my part to create very particular material in order to engage them. The level of engagement may also be in part because this is the first play where students designed the costumes and lights, in large part, themselves. This has been a really fruitful and uplifting experiment. There has also been strong collaboration between the Drama and Crafts departments in terms of teacher and student mentoring. It has always been a dream of Luis' and mine that we would reach a place where we would have even more inter-departmental collaboration and, this time, we have managed to uphold that ideal.

The other unique condition of this play is that we have, in large part, constructed and written our own play. Although it is not unusual for me to write large sections of the class plays, and pepper in classic texts, in this case, we have really written our own complete narrative - a play within a play. Pandemonium is full of Drama department jokes and crazy Patrice-isms. We had fun laughing at ourselves and the process of making plays, although I suspect much of the laughter was directed at me!

I started this journey with the specific goal that it be particularly fun and collaborative, and it has been, even for me! Plays are always hard work, challenging and sometimes uncomfortable, as nothing really good can ever be born without some hardship and sacrifice, especially within such short timeframes. Despite three days' less rehearsal time than any other play, the class has pulled it off in style. The laughter that has rung

through our auditorium in the last three weeks will be felt by you, the audience, when you come to our performance on December 28th and 29th (four days away!).

This will be Class 10's last play at Michael Park School and I urge the community to come out in force to support and witness them. This class's wonderful Class 8 play had to be performed under covid conditions, so they have never experienced the thrill of a jam-packed auditorium. As their teacher, I feel that this class really needs a chance to shine, and they need the community to witness it. I absolutely guarantee that

> you will have a fantastic evening, as this will be true Pandemonium and a very funny production.

So, dear community, this play is absolutely NOT to be missed! I know you are tired; I know it is the end of the year; I know that Mondays and Tuesdays are not ideal days for people to attend plays, but... we need you... and you will be rewarded for that effort, I promise! The magic and curse of theatre is that it will exist only for two nights and then, as Shakespeare said, will "melt into air, into thin air".

We are all prone to a bit of apathy in these covid times, but please make the extra effort for this class. When you hear how fun the show was, you might kick yourselves if you

miss it. Finally, Cathy has got her Christmas pantomime! Pandemonium is in the spirit of pantomime, but with wittier material.

Although fairly harmless, there are some saucy jokes, most of which will go over young ones' heads, and a few naughty words. Our recommendation is that Pandemonium is appropriate for class 6 and above.

It will be a raucous, cheeky, hysterical evening of Pandemonium!



PLUNKET ONLINE BABYSITTING COURSE



Let's babysit safely this summer!

This course with updated material, is designed to give teens from age 14, the knowledge and skills to babysit children of all ages. It's written for first time babysitters, so you don't need to have previous experience to enrol.

The course uses fun and informative videos, quizzes and activities divided into nine modules. The course takes around 2-3 hours to complete over three weeks.

You will learn about:

- the role of the babysitter, including the expectations of the families they are working for
- child safety, including emergency situations, and basic first aid
- ages and stages of children from birth to school age, their basic needs and their care
- professional behaviour including presentation
- how to engage with children of different ages, including activities for each age group and behavioural information
- how to get a babysitting job.
