EDGE PARENT PORTAL AND APP

It is very encouraging to see families now using the Edge caregiver portal for absentee notifications and other functions.

A few things to note:

- To log in for the first time, enter your email address (the one we have on file for you) and hit 'forgot password' or 'reset password'. A full set of instructions can be found here: <u>https://michaelpark.school.nz/wp-content/</u> <u>uploads/2023/02/How-to-access-the-edge-portal.pdf</u>
- The absentee function on the app is only for whole/half day absences for illness or doctor/dentist appointments. This automatically marks the roll for us which speeds up our morning absentee checks. For all notifications other than illness or doctor/dentist appointments, i.e. running late, on holiday, or need to get a message to a student or teacher, please phone or send an email to reception.
- Emails from the school that used to come via SchoolLinks will now come directly from <u>admin@michaelpark.school.nz</u> or from the staff member's email address. Please check your junk or spam folder.
- We will be discontinuing SchoolLinks for school messaging later this term, and using The Edge exclusively. **The Kindergarten will continue to use SchoolLinks.

There may be more questions that arise as we get accustomed to using the Edge portal and app. We will address these as they occur.

Karakia o te Rā

Whakataka Te Hau

In this space we would like to occasionally share karakia that can be used at events and in everyday life. This karakia below, Whakataka Te Hau, is often intertwined into whaikorero on the marae, or said at the opening of meetings, or can be said at the beginning of the day. At this time, our thoughts are with those who have been affected by the recent extreme weather, and with our whanau at Taikura Rudolf Steiner School, as the people of Hawke's Bay wake up every morning to the realities of what has happened all around their rohe. In my time working at Taikura, I often heard this karakia recited (and sung) by the whole kura during morning briefings, assemblies and special events - it is always moving to hear it. The karakia describes a still crisp morning when the sun is rising with a "red tipped dawn" over the land. It is an evocation of the wonder and beauty of our world; the winds have died down, there is only a gentle breeze, and in the stillness, there is the "promise of a glorious day". The qualities of a soft early morning can become a much-needed picture of hopefulness, and a balm, during this hard time.
