

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HIGH SCHOOL INDUSTRIAL ACTION NEXT WEEK

We have been advised by the National Executive of PPTA that the strike action of rostering home is to now include two-year groups each day for Monday to Thursday for the rest of the term.

We have been looking at options of how we can continue to keep students at school. Unfortunately, this week, we have seen rise in numbers of students and staff sick, and we are not able to source relief teachers, nor do we have the capacity to supervise the classes internally.

As a result it means that we will be rostering classes to stay home from Monday.

TAKURUA FESTIVAL

Dear friends.

As we approach mid-winter, we prepare ourselves and our school for the Takurua (Winter) Festival, happening on Friday, 23 June, around the winter solstice.

This has been a particularly wet winter when the change in season has been more evident. On the surface where the plant world comes to a relative stillness, we see fallen leaves, muddy soils and cloudy grey skies, while the activity moves down to the roots, where the sap and the seeds wait dormant with all their potential, gathering energy and strength in wait for warmer days, away from our awareness, invisible to our senses. It is in winter that we feel closer to earth as our connection with the natural world deepens and we turn inward in search of answers. This is very different to the summer days we long for, where our focus is very external, and our spirit is lifted up.

If we are mindful to remember how it works, we can find rebirth in decay, and hope and beauty in damp rainy days. Steiner spoke of the Greek philosopher, Diogenes, who went round the marketplace in Athens, carrying a lantern in his hand in search of the "man" who was lost, the "man" who had lost his spiritual vision and his search for the inner impulse. Diogenes felt that the time was approaching when "man" would be plunged into darkness and would have to be sought for with a lantern. A good metaphor for the soul forces necessary for finding the inner light in winter times.

"To town you must go; and take a lantern, child, to light your mother through the snow..."

We hope you will join us for the festival in three weeks. There are few opportunities in our school to gather our whole community for an evening of celebration. We are especially hopeful that we will see lots of our teenagers around.

The Takurua Festival in its current format started three years ago, when the Spiral and the Lantern Festivals, which happened

very close to each other and which carried a very similar impulse, were merged into one.

Plans are well on their way: Class 7 is developing their leadership skills and preparing a movement performance with fire staves to lead the walk; Classes 1-6 are rehearsing the songs they will perform for us; Class 6 has spent a couple of weeks making grottos out of clay and will be setting up beautiful little villages around tree land, and lower school teachers are preparing stories to tell their classes and making the traditional lanterns with their students.

Class 8 will be warming up the festival mood and selling food at the lunch bar from 4pm.

We will start with inspiring singing at 5:30pm at the stairs in front of Class 2 and 3, after which the Lantern Walk around the school will lead to the spiral that will be set up by students on the soccer field. The festival will end with a few fires to roast food on. We encourage everyone present to walk the spiral as it builds beautiful sense of community.

So, undust your old lanterns, or start making your new ones, and get your gumboots ready...! See you there!

DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme has around 40 students enrolled throughout the high school at Michael Park. The Award requires students to commit to activities of skill, service, physical recreation and an adventurous journey. Training for the adventurous journey is carried out in regular sessions after school. Over the last 3 weeks, many of the students have undertaken expeditions at Bronze, Silver and Gold levels.

The Bronze and Silver groups, from classes 8 to 11, were originally planning to explore the Hunua Ranges. However, a wet and windy forecast saw a late change of plan, and as a result the inaugural MPS Auckland Volcano challenge was hastily put together! Groups had to plan their own routes to score as many points as possible, by visiting volcanic cones around Auckland and performing a number of challenges, such as erecting a tent on the summit and making a hot drink. Saturday night saw groups all meet up at school, with the bad weather forcing everyone inside to sleep in the gym. The Bronze groups completed the expedition the next day whilst the Silvers went on to sleep another night, this time at a local Scout hall. Extra challenges for them included an hour of community service and undertaking a random act of kindness!

Despite the horizontal rain, morale remained high and all groups rose to the challenge admirably. Navigation skills were tested to the limit, with the maps provided being less than ideal, both in extent and not being waterproof! Each team planned, supplied and cooked their own menu and were responsible for their own gear throughout – a significant step towards independence for many. They completed the process by delivering a short presentation of their trip to their peers.

Last weekend was the turn of the Gold students from classes 11 and 12. An intrepid group left on Friday morning to explore some of the more adventurous routes in the Kaimai ranges. Leon Kment provides this account:


Over the King's birthday weekend (Fri-Mon) Cameron, Ben, Leon, Luka and Catherine embarked on their Duke of Edinburgh Gold Practice journey and Reed on his qualifier. Our team of 6, shadowed by David Le Pelley and Roger Firth, tramped for 4 days through the Kaimais for around 50km. Often the path was blocked by fallen trees or entirely swept away by the previous cyclones we can all still remember. But no matter how long it took to find the path again we prevailed and our navigation skills got put to good practice. Many songs and jokes accompanied us and ensured everyone kept going even if the legs and shoulders asked for a break. The stunning views, the warming campfire and the full moon were the inspiration and drive to keep climbing even further and to start another day. They were the well-deserved rewards for our efforts. Not only did the team have beautiful views but with pancakes and jam

for breakfast we were not short of fine dining in the bush. I must say, there is something magical in setting up camp in the native New Zealand bush, the river gurgling right nearby, and everything smells so fresh and untouched... On the final day the rain made an appearance and we all got flushed out of the Kaimais. But no matter how hard it rained our good spirits could not quite be drowned. It is going to be so awesome going on the next tramp!


