And just to prove the power of skill learnt from specialised mentors, MPS won 8 to 1 against St. Kentigerns directly following the workshop.





WONDER WORDS - THE PROCESS

At the end of last year, I announced my intention to allow myself to rethink the outer form of the play process and be open to new looks and approaches. Despite my new ideas, the art and act of speaking was the area that most challenged this class.

Many began this process with a huge fear of speaking. Much of our time has been in the rich and processed based work of overcoming these fears. This is the work of 'the play behind the play' and is the art drama therapy through the spoken word. This is the work of finding your voice through the voice of another.



What we have ended up creating together is quite unexpected to me. It is a comedy about the fear of speaking. It has evolved organically as the obvious comedic expression, born out of the classes own process and challenges. In this play you will see a highly effective set, fabulous props, vibrant colour and our Tamariki really sharing their voices in a comedic and zany, but poignant production.

WONDER WORDS - THE PLAY (Appropriate for Class 5 and Above)

Our creation, Wonder Words, is a zany pantomimic, comic look at the fear of speaking and the process of finding the courage to share their voices. Peppered with superheroes and song and Baz Luhrmann-type comedy, it shifts between the inner and outer reality of three teenage protagonists. One has been held back by an irrational fear of what others think of her and plays out extreme versions of her worst fears of how, in her mind, others see her.

The second teen is plagued by voices of selfdoubt and does not believe in himself while the third has a history of stuttering and is terrified of words. All three must face and overcome a fear of speaking and putting their voice out in the world. I think this will be a fun and zany evening. The community will enjoy seeing some unexpected castings and bold performances.

I have been personally uplifted to see our tamariki face their fears head on and let their voices out. This is the great satisfaction and victory of this production, and I think you will find it equally thrilling to see our tamariki tread the boards and put themselves out there in such a bold, courageous and zany way. What is particularly moving for me, is that our leading actors, playing our four protagonists, had to overcome significant challenges and a barrier in themselves to achieve the performance that you will see. Their victory has been hard earned and each one, along with many of their classmates, have taken themselves through a conscious process of growth.

WORLD REFUGEE DAY

Tuesday, the 20th of June was World Refugee Day.

We are so thankful to MPS for the continued support for the students at the Mangere Refugee Centre, a residential facility with housing, immigration, medical and psychological services, and education. There are only two other centres like this in the world.

Our students are with us for five weeks and, in that time, there are information sessions about life in NZ and English lessons for adults. We run a full secondary, primary and early

childhood programme every day, and an afterschool programme two days a week. Due to housing issues, some families are with us for more than one intake.



MPS students are

supporting us with the after-school programme on a Monday and Tuesday. We are really thankful to Bibi Miller, Elita Hooker, Cosima Newton, Layla Robinson and Sienna Laban for giving up their time to bring joy to our students. Layla and Sienna have also been supporting classes through the Gateway programme.

MPS hosted our secondary students for a day at Michael Park, trying new skills and, most importantly, meeting other students. The visit gives them such confidence and is a real highlight in their time with us. We will visit again in August with a new intake. A huge thank you to Luis Bernal, Barney Groom, Michelle Mullany and Ciaran Overton for organising a wonderful programme of craft and sports, with Andrew and Des overseeing it all.



We have been privileged to have MPS parents also helping here at the Refugee Centre. David Le Pelley leads team building sessions once an intake, and Tarquin Hooker teaches art (she worked with the students on the beautiful Korowhai that is hanging in the High School.) Also, former MPS student Ruby Legg drives our team and supports after-school care.


