KINDERGARTEN ERO FINDINGS

Last week we had an Education Review Office (ERO) team of assessors visit. ERO visits all schools and early childhood centres across Aotearoa to assess compliance with regulations, quality, and outcomes for children.

They present their draft findings in a 300-word report which the kindergarten will comment on for errors of fact before it becomes finalized and published, in about 6 weeks.

As part of the process, they do a synthesis of findings which they shared verbally with me, the teachers, the departing Chair of the Trust Darren Rawlins and new kindergarten portfolio holder Christian Holden.

I am very pleased and proud to be able to share their feedback with you:

'Loved being here. Felt welcomed and the sense of manaakitanga.'

'Beautiful natural environment and philosophy.'

'Kindergarten manager responsive and well-prepared, information easily accessible.'

'Since the last review there has been significant positive progress.'

'Full compliance with all the regulatory requirements.'

'Very assured of a safe environment for children.'

'Direction for policy and procedure reflects the very tight regulatory environment in ECE.'

'Teachers very intentional in their teaching. High levels imagination, creativity, and exploration in children's play.'

Kaiako have intentionally considered the learning environment supporting children to to sustain their play for long periods of time.

'Oral language and literacy is a strong feature with children having many opportunities through storytelling, rhyme, conversation.' They noted that the children had 'developed a good sense of humour.'

'Children express themselves confidently.'

'Curriculum of respect is evident everywhere; teachers are acknowledging emotions of children.'

'Home languages valued, and identity recognized.'

'Children have many opportunities to share their own language and culture and learn about others.'

'Learning focussed partnerships with whanau are evident.'

'Feedback tells us whanau feel a connection and a strong sense of belonging.'

'Engagement with whanau highly valued by Kaiako.'

'Service has a genuine commitment to tiriti.'

'All children are experiencing and environment where Tikanga and te reo is interwoven through curriculum.'

'Te reo and Te Ao Maori meaningful and well embedded into everyday life which can be both seen and felt when in

kindergarten'

'Maori whanau had opportunities to contribute.'

'Culturally responsive practice seen.'

'Highly reflective as a team and individually.'

'Kaiako have a commitment to and support for ongoing learning and receive specific feedback about practice teaching practice.'

'Children with additional needs are well supported. Learning is focussed on identifying and naming barriers to allow them to fully participate in learning.'

'Highly reflective aa a team and this is having a positive impact on children.

'Assessment captures the individual child.'

'Teachers draw on a range of information to inform assessment.'

'Questions from teachers promote meaningful feedback from whānau.'

'Assessment is increasingly intentional, using learning outcomes to inform planning.'

And finally

'You are beautiful with those children. Children are so comfortable. You know them well. Calm and unhurried is putting it mildly. Peaceful.

As they left, they shared how given the opportunity they would have liked to enroll their own children / grandchildren here and what a pleasure the review had been.

Once the report is drafted there will be an improvement action around strengthening internal evaluation and evaluation of curriculum, which we agreed was a fair next step.

I would also like to take a moment to specifically congratulate the kindergarten kaiako for their outstanding work. It was for me personally a truly uplifting experience to sit and listen to two experienced ERO assessors sing the praises of our kindergarten team, and have them really see, understand, and appreciate the deeply held, Steiner pedagogy that we work with every day to create this beautiful experience for the children.

It is clear after these few days that we, as a kindergarten and community, are truly blessed to have such an inspiring, dedicated, capable and hardworking team of teachers. And I am so very pleased the ERO assessors were able to see and appreciate their work for what it really is.

The ERO assessors were also very complimentary of the work I have been doing in my role as the kindergarten manager and their praise was certainly appreciated!

Thank you to everybody who contributed to and supported us through this review.
