
CLASS & INDIVIDUAL PHOTOS

"That's the cheese that stumped me" CLASS 12 MAIN LESSON SOCIETY AND FILM

This main lesson with Ms. Meek looks at Classic film noir from the 1940s. We also looked at how art history and the years leading up to the 1940s influenced Noir. For example, Gangster Films were popular in the 1930s because the Great Depression had left many people unemployed, and crime became a way to earn a living for a lot of people.

Film Noir means dark film. It is a film that sets the dark mood right from the start. Our assessment was to create a 1 to 2 minute short film on mobiles, using film noir conventions like chiaroscuro lighting (harsh lighting), the femme fatale and the morally ambiguous narrator. We had to use film noir slang in our scripts.

Class Five Botany Main Lesson b

Botany is taught in Class Five, typically when students are around 11 years old. At this stage, they're moving from imaginative to intellectual learning. They're in between these two ways of learning, so we focus on observing and nurturing a sense of wonder. Children of this age really want to understand the world, but more in a feeling way than a scientific one.

Therefore, we teach Botany in an artistic rather than strictly scientific way. Through observation and artistic work, students are led to information that will help develop their capacities for scientific thinking in the future, while also expanding their consciousness in a in a developmentally appropriate way.

In our first Botany Main Lesson, we looked at the 'scientific' aspects of plants. For the first time, students learned about metamorphosis, photosynthesis, and the water cycle as processes happening in the physical world. We approached these ideas artistically and always in relation to plants and humans. Then, we started exploring what makes a plant. We began with a seed and learned about germination, then we moved on to pollination with the 'Three B's - Bees, Butterflies, and Beetles'.

Deep class discussions about similarities and differences between human and plant processes helped students grapple with big picture topics that are on their minds at this age, but in a fascinating and wonder-filled context.

Main Lesson activities included close observation drawing and wax modelling, seed germination, 'scientific' diagramming, artistic work, poetry, and more. The students further developed their eye for detail, sketching and shading skills, and language arts skills, while engaging in challenging discussions and enriching intellectual activities.

This Botany Main Lesson was literally and metaphorically 'planting the seed' for future academic studies in biology, both elemental and human. When approached in such a way, focusing on cultivating a love of science and observation skills, it became one of those 'golden' Waldorf Main Lessons where every day had a sprinkle of magic.




















Class 8 Main Lesson - The Industrial Revolution

This was a period (1760-1900) in which fundamental changes occurred in agriculture, textiles, metal manufacture and the social structure in England. The Industrial Revolution was a like a big rock being dropped into a pond. It stirred up may societies and sent ripples all around the world. Class 8 explored the changes in society, working conditions, and the environment as effects of the era.













Class 10 Surveying Camp

As part of our Surveying main lesson, we went on a camp for 2 nights to Whatipu which is 44km out on the west coast of Auckland. This is what Amelia Haynes had to say on behalf of the class.

"During this camp, we utilized our knowledge of linear and radial surveying techniques. We used measuring tapes to measure distances and compasses to measure bearings between posts. We produced a scaled map of the surveyed area using the data collected and presented it in the form of a poster.

Our camp at Whatipu was very interesting as we stayed at the oldest building in New Zealand that is still liveable. This gave the place a very homely and comfortable feel, especially when we were enjoying home cooked meals prepared by our classmates. On the first evening we took a trip down to the Whatipu beach and, on our last evening, we got to explore the Whatipu caves, which is something class 8 and 9 can look forward to.

Overall, this camp provided us an opportunity for experiential learning and challenged our practical and mental capacities."

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Celebrating the Christmas Foundation Conference Centenary

MUSIC - EURYTHMY - SPEECH 27th April 7pm 2024

Music with an accompanied choral concert directed by Stuart Lithgow Eurythmy directed by Kimberle Haswell Speech with Michael Burton

Rudolf Steiner's Christmas Foundation Conference took place in 1923/24 on the site of the Goetheanum in Switzerland. In honour of the centennial, we invite you to a unique opportunity to experience an evening of music, eurythmy, and speech.

Stuart Lithgow will direct '100 Years', an accompanied choral concert, composed by Dale Jones. This is a musical reflection set to excerpts from the Foundation Stone Meditation, a verse given by Rudolf Steiner. The piece is in three parts; 'You Live in the Limbs', 'You Live in the Beat of Heart and Lung' and 'You Live in the Resting Head'.

Kimberle Haswell will direct the Foundation Stone Meditation in Eurythmy. This was performed for the first time on the 20th April 1924 with forms, lighting, costumes, and gesture indications provided by Rudolf Steiner. Five years ago, Kimberle Haswell and others began exploring this in Eurythmy. Since then, Kimberle has led the Hestia Eurythmy group, a collection of committed community members, who will share this work in commemoration of the centennial celebrations.

In addition to the Music and Eurythmy elements, Michael Burton will be narrating the powerful spoken word of the Foundation Stone Meditation. It has been described as urging us to have strength and to seek wisdom and truth in the past, present, and future through three processes of 'spirit recollection,' spirit contemplation,' and 'spirit beholding'.




