MICHAEL PARK AT MODEL UNITED NATIONS ASSEMBLY (MUNA)

On the 16th and 17th of May, two teams from Michael Park School represented China (Luca, Finlay, and Amelia) and Tanzania (Emma, Zoe, Sana, and Sarah) at the annual Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA), held at Rosmini College.

More than 52 schools from across Auckland and Northland took part, each representing a country's political perspective; regardless of their own personal views. Delegates debated a wide range of global issues, including whether the Internet is a human right, climate change, unfair labour practices, and the use of Al in warfare.

The event was filled with drama, controversy, and excitement: allegations of bribing the Secretary-General with lollies, heated debates between countries, accusations of Al-written speeches, and formal condemnations all added to the realistic and dynamic atmosphere.

Some highlights included dressing in traditional clothing, passing diplomatic notes during sessions, following unfolding political storylines, and, of course, enjoying delicious international cuisine.

Overall, it was a fantastic opportunity to learn about global politics and engage in meaningful discussions—while still having plenty of light-hearted fun.

MATARIKI CELEBRATIONS



Matariki Traditions

Matariki can be a time to reflect, gather and plan, a time to find ways to bring warmth and light into the cold season, and a time to develop traditions that weave the three principles of Matariki Hunga Nui (remembrance), Matariki Ahunga Nui (celebrating the present) and Matariki Manako Nui (looking to the future) into celebrations. As Rangi Matamua says, 'anyone can celebrate Matariki. Whether you're continuing a tradition of your tupuna or starting a new one, Matariki is for everyone'.

A beautiful and unique part of the Matariki festival is the way that it honours the past, both through the star, Pōhutukawa (the star connected to those who have passed), and through the stories of Te Waka o Rangi, the great waka in the sky. During the live broadcast of the hautapu ceremony (this year honouring Puanga), it is always moving hearing the voices of different iwi calling the names of their dead into the dawn sky, bidding them farewell as they join the stars. This sacred element of Matariki can offer significant healing and comfort for whānau and communities, intertwined with the celebration of the present and planning for the future.

How My Koro Became a Star by Brianne Te Paa is a beautiful and moving Matariki story about a child who is taught the tikanga of Matariki by his koro (grandfather), and then when the grandfather passes away, the grandson keeps up the tikanga. This story shares the Matariki wisdom about the journey of Te Waka o Rangi, the great waka in the sky that carries the souls of those we have lost in the previous year, releasing them as stars into the sky.

If you want some ideas for Matariki, here are some lovely ones that people have shared:

- Find your own ways of honouring the loved ones you have lost in the year past. Look for Te Waka o Rangi in the morning sky – on a good clear (very) early morning, it can be quite visible.
- Keep an eye and ear out for the events happening around Tāmaki Makaurau – there are more every year.
- Share stories ask each member of the whānau to write a story about a favourite memory. Share these stories at a special dinner or around a fire, and then collect these stories into a folder to read again in future years. One day you might have enough to make a book!
- Gather with friends for an early morning walk up a maunga to spot the Matariki cluster, before sharing a Matariki breakfast.
- Create a gratitude wall or hanging mobile for people to write down things they are grateful for.
- Rug up warm and cook on an outdoor fire.


John Lawry

Born 31.5.1950, in Auckland, New Zealand, a fifth generation South Pacific Celt, my life experience as an artisan & educator spans more than five decades.

In 2010, a confluence of my life-long interest and immersion in craft and education occurred when, inspired by Bernard Graves, I began establishing and developing the Outdoor Classroom at Michael Park Steiner School. This included site surveys, comprehensive curriculum gardens, a lower-school craft/experiential skills-based curriculum, its integration into H/S Technology, an intensive Masterclass Craft program and camps.

Word spread: tasks multiplied; O.C. teacher training courses, consulting, presenting workshops and papers and organizing conferences ensued. I "retired" from full-time teaching at the end of 2016 and established "Artisan Pathways" to run masterclass workshops, craft immersion camps, travel and consult in New Zealand, Australia and Southeast Asia and to craft and garden more.
